The Chattahoochee River is a treasure trove of stories. From the Franklin, Ga. man who caught a 75-pound snapping turtle in the 1950s and sold it to a Hogansville restaurant for 75 cents a pound to Union soldiers who swam the river naked to surprise Confederate sentries during the Civil War, the river offers up stories amusing, inspiring and disturbing all along its 436-mile length.

Join Joe Cook, author of the new "Chattahoochee River User's Guide," as he shares some of the little known secrets that make the Chattahoochee Georgia's most evocative river. This comprehensive guide is the product of years of research by Cook, who also paddled the length of the Chattahoochee in 1995 and co-authored "River Song — A Journey Down the Chattahoochee and Apalachicola Rivers."
